What are Harris and Trump's policies?

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American voters will face a clear <u>choice</u> for president on <u>election day</u>, between Democratic Vice-President Kamala Harris and Republican Donald Trump.

Here's a look at what they stand for and how their policies compare on different issues.

Economy

Harris has said her day-one priority <u>would</u> be trying to reduce food and housing costs for working families.

She <u>promises</u> to ban price-gouging on groceries, help first-time home buyers and provide incentives to increase housing supply.

Trump has promised to "end inflation and make America affordable again".

He <u>has promised</u> to deliver <u>lower</u> interest rates, something the president does not <u>control</u>, and he <u>says</u> deporting <u>undocumented immigrants</u> will ease pressure on housing.

Abortion

Harris <u>has made</u> <u>abortion rights</u> central to her <u>campaign</u>, and she continues to <u>advocate</u> for <u>legislation</u> that <u>would</u> enshrine reproductive rights nationwide.

Trump has struggled to find a consistent message in recent weeks.

The three judges he appointed to the Supreme Court while president were pivotal in overturning the constitutional right to an abortion, a 1973 ruling known as Roe v Wade.

Immigration

Harris was tasked with tackling the root causes of the southern border crisis and helped raise **billions** of dollars of private money to make regional investments **aimed at** stemming the flow north.

Record numbers of people crossed from Mexico at the end of 2023 but the numbers <u>have fallen since</u>. In this <u>campaign</u>, she has <u>toughened</u> her stance and emphasised her experience as a **prosecutor** in California taking on human traffickers.

Trump <u>has vowed</u> to seal the border by completing the construction of a wall and increasing enforcement. But he <u>urged</u> Republicans to ditch a hardline, cross-party border bill, <u>backed by</u> Harris.

He <u>has also promised the biggest</u> mass deportation of undocumented migrants in US history. Experts told <u>the BBC</u> this <u>would</u> face <u>legal challenges</u>.

Taxes

Harris wants to raise taxes on big <u>businesses</u> and Americans making <u>\$400,000</u> (£305,000) a year.

But she <u>has also unveiled</u> a number of <u>measures</u> that <u>would</u> ease the tax burden on families, <u>including</u> an expansion of <u>child tax credits</u>.

Trumn proposes a number of tax cuts worth trillions including an extension of his

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2017 cuts which mostly helped <u>the wealthy</u>. He says he will pay for them <u>through</u> <u>higher</u> growth and tariffs on <u>imports</u>.

Analysts say <u>both</u> tax plans will add to the ballooning deficit, but Trump's by more.

Foreign policy

Harris has vowed to support Ukraine "for as long as it takes". She has pledged, if

He has said he would end the war in Ukraine in 24 <u>hours through</u> a <u>negotiated</u> settlement with Russia, a move that Democrats say would embolden Vladimir Putin.

Trump has positioned himself as a <u>staunch</u> supporter of Israel but <u>said little</u> on how he would end the war in Gaza.



Trade

Harris <u>has criticised</u> Trump's sweeping plan to put tariffs on <u>imports</u>, calling it a national tax on working families which will cost each <u>household</u> <u>\$4,000</u> a year. She <u>is</u> <u>expected to have</u> a <u>more targeted approach</u> to taxing imports.

Trump has made tariffs a central **pledge** in this campaign. He has proposed new 10-20% tariffs on <u>most</u> foreign goods, and <u>much higher</u> ones on those from China.



Climate

Harris, as vice-president, helped pass the Inflation Reduction Act, which <u>has funnelled</u> hundreds of <u>billions</u> of dollars to <u>renewable energy</u>, and <u>electric vehicle tax credit</u> and <u>rebate programmes</u>.

But she has dropped her opposition to fracking, a <u>technique</u> for recovering gas and oil opposed by environmentalists.

Trump, while in the White House, rolled back hundreds of environmental protections,

including limits on carbon dioxide emissions from power plants and vehicles.

In this campaign he has vowed to expand Arctic drilling and attacked electric cars.



Healthcare

Harris has been part of a White House administration which has reduced prescription drug costs and <u>capped</u> insulin prices at \$35.

Trump <u>has said</u> he will not renew his attempts while president to dismantle the Affordable Care Act, which extended <u>insurance</u> to millions more people.

He <u>has called</u> for taxpayer-funded fertility treatment, but that <u>could</u> be opposed by Republicans in Congress.

Crime

Harris has tried to contrast her experience as a **prosecutor** with the fact Trump **has** been convicted of a crime.

Trump has vowed to demolish drugs cartels, crush gang violence and rebuild Democratic-run cities that he says are overrun with crime.

Guns

Harris has made preventing gun violence a key **pledge**, and she and Tim Walz - both gun owners - often <u>advocate</u> for <u>tighter</u> laws. But they will find that moves like **expanding background checks** or **banning assault weapons** will need the help of Congress.

Trump has positioned himself as a <u>staunch</u> defender of the Second Amendment, the constitutional right to <u>bear</u> arms. Addressing the National Rifle Association in May, he said he was their <u>best friend</u>.
